

COVID-19 Vaccine Update

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ARC COVID-19 vaccine rollout

More than 66,000 Pfizer COVID-19 vaccine doses have been administered in New Zealand to date, with over 14,000 people having received their second dose to be fully vaccinated.

We are aware that a few members have already had the vaccine rolled out onsite to their staff and several DHBs, notably Nelson and Southern, are administering vaccines to members' staff at local vaccination clinics. If you haven't already, you should expect to hear from your DHB shortly after Easter weekend to arrange for the first dose of staff vaccinations. DHBs are now moving rapidly on the rollout of the first dose so please be ready with numbers of staff and residents planning to receive vaccines. DHBs are likely to ask for final numbers the day before the vaccinations take place.

Earlier this week the NZACA, in conjunction with the DHB Health of Older Peoples (HOPs) portfolio managers and Senior Responsibility Officers (SROs), presented its paper to the Ministry of Health (MOH) outlining the desired national approach to the COVID-19 vaccine rollout for aged residential care (ARC) facilities.

The preference is for a mixed model service delivery approach for ARC, meaning that two or more delivery models could be operating to reflect the particular needs of the diverse range of facilities (e.g., Outreach teams, Primary care providers and / or ARC provider themselves delivering vaccinations). Vaccination services into aged care will be coordinated and commissioned by DHBs across the ARC facilities in their regions.

Consent forms

Residents

The NZACA's <u>consent form for resident vaccinations</u> was provided to members last week. If you haven't done so already, now is the time to begin the process of gaining consent from residents with an Enduring Power of Attorney (EPOA). The consent form needs to be printed (2 pages double-sided, black and white is sufficient) for each resident. Residents able to consent for themselves can do so on the day of vaccination. Residents and staff also need to be provided with the following documents prior to vaccination:

- <u>Getting your COVID-19 vaccine: what to expect</u>
- <u>After your immunisation</u>
- Privacy statement

Staff

We have received a number of member queries around the need to know the vaccine status of their employees. Everyone who receives the vaccine will be given a Vaccine Record Card. The NZACA advises that you ask your employees to show you this card. Employees will be given a consent form by their vaccinator to sign at the time of vaccination so we will not be circulating a consent form for staff at this time.

Introductory Guide to the COVID-19 Vaccination Programme

The Immunisation Advisory Centre (IMAC) has released a general interest course designed for health professionals that provides information about the mRNA-CV COVID-19 vaccine.

There is no assessment or certificate provided—this is for general interest only. If you are nominated by your DHB to administer the COVID-19 vaccine you need to complete the COVID-19 Vaccinator Education Course, to which the introductory guide is a non-mandatory prelude.

Section 4 of the Introductory Guide to the COVID-19 Vaccination Programme is a useful resource for answering questions about the COVID-19 vaccine and vaccination programme including the following **quick tips to support positive communications.**

 Acknowledge that COVID-19 vaccines have transient but uncomfortable side effects, including a sore arm and fever. These do in fact show that the vaccine is helping prepare the body to fight the disease!

We aim to provide you with the most up-to-date information. We are however, working in an ever-moving environment which means information and advice can change rapidly.

- Likewise, acknowledge that these vaccines have been manufactured faster than previous vaccines before listing off reasons why this has been the case.
- If somebody shows vaccine hesitance or ambivalence, be empathetic and acknowledge their concerns. The objective of any conversation should be to build trust and rapport. Active listening fosters receptivity.
